
Joe had an office (Room 112) on the first floor of the Webb Student Center, during his tenure as Judicial Vice President, elected by the student body.

Astronomy Courses were first implemented by Professor C.S. Sherwood, III, utilizing the Pretlow Planetarium, adjacent to the Alfriend Chemistry Building. He was a great mentor and friend, and an outstanding professor. He was a graduate of the University of Chicago, and held a teaching appointment, during WWII instructing in "Celestial Navigation" for Naval officers. So knowledgeable of his subject, he often presented lectures to our Astronomy course, in the Pretlow Planetarium, from memory. He was a fine Christian, who was a good friend, and outstanding mentor.

C.S. Sherwood III; retired professor

PORTSMOUTH — Prof. Calder Smith Sherwood III, 65, of 111 West Road, the first ODU teacher to be honored with professor emeritus status in two departments, died Tuesday in a hospital.

Sherwood, a native of Portsmouth, was professor of physics and geophysical sciences. He was professor emeritus in the Chemistry Department and also in the Department of Physics and Geophysical Sciences.

He retired after 38 years of teaching and was honored with a dinner April 22 at Webb University Center.

Dr. Dale Lick, dean of the School of Sciences and Health Professions at ODU, said of Sherwood: "He's had a profound impact on a broad spectrum of science students, particularly (those in) chemistry and astronomy.

"He's probably the professor of more doctors and dentists than any other at the university," Dr. Lick said.

He became an instructor in 1939 when the school was the College of William and Mary's Norfolk division. He estimated he had taught about 4,000 students since then. He was a William and Mary instructor three years before joining ODU faculty. One of his special interests was in working with youth and civic groups. He worked more than 25 years with a North Carolina boys' summer camp. He also was instru-

mental in establishing planetarium programs in Portsmouth and Chesapeake.

He was a lifelong Portsmouth resident. He was a member of Port Norfolk Baptist Church, Seaboard Masonic Lodge 56, the Torch Club, and American Chemical society.

He was a Navy veteran of World War II.

He is survived by five cousins, Dr. Leonard L. Davis of Portsmouth, W. Wallace Face of Norfolk, Lee A. Wallace of Falls Church, Mrs. Clinton A. Walker of Virginia Beach, and Mrs. Allen M. Johnson of New Orleans.

A funeral will be held Thursday at 3 p.m. in Oak Grove Cemetery. Masonic rites will be accorded at the grave. The family will be at Loving & Gay Funeral Home, Churchland, tonight from 7 to 9. They suggest memorial donations to the C. S. Sherwood Scholarship Endowment Fund, or the Educational Foundation, ODU, Norfolk.





Calder S. Sherwood, III, Professor of Chemistry; B.S., College of William and Mary; M.S., University of Chicago.






Professor Richard Rutyna teaching a Colonial American History class. He was one of my professors at ODU.


