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NEW BAPTIST CHURCH NEARLY COMPLETED

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The new South Norfolk Baptist Church, which has been in course of construction for some time, is expected to be completed about July 1. The work on the building was done by carpenters, who are members of the congregation, without charge and the only expense was for material. The building will be modern in every particular.

Rev. Wm. Black is the pastor and has personally looked after the construction work. He has a congregation of about five hundred members and a great majority of these are actively at work for the upbuilding and progress of the work of the church in the community.

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"CITIZENS" PROGRAM IN COUNTY DEVELOPS

New Reported Fusion Candidates Will Be Denounced And Reforms Advocated

It was political gossip yesterday afternoon that the recently organized Citizens' party in Norfolk county, which had its origin in South Norfolk, and was made up of what has been known throughout the state as the fusion party of Norfolk county, will come out in a few days, perhaps next Thursday evening, when a meeting will be held in Firemen's hall, South Norfolk, renouncing fusion and fusionism in Norfolk county, and will put in nomination a strong ticket of candidates who have heretofore been known for the most part as Straightout Democrats, whose loyalty to that party with which they were associated was never questioned.

It was further hinted that this new party may carry on a flirtation with the Straightout Democrats of the county, by not placing into the field candidates for certain offices now held by Straightouts.

It was stated that all known fusion office holders, whose sympathies are with the fusion movement, will not only be knifed, but that strong opposition will be placed in the field against them.

Simultaneously with this announcement, S. W. Lyons, now treasurer of Norfolk county, announced that he will not accept another nomination or allow his name to be run again for the office he now holds, and it was said that Dr. J. P. Jackson, who ran a few years ago on the Straightout ticket for one of the county offices, will be the Citizens' party candidate for county treasurer, and that Deputy Sheriff Carmine, who professes Straightout proclivities, will be the Citizens' candidate for sheriff against C. L. Old, the incumbent.

Harry B. Gibson of Rosemont, who has been an ardent Straightout since he became old enough to vote, is now mentioned in connection with the office of commissioner of revenue for the second district.

TANK BUILDERS STRIKE CALLED OFF

Standard Boiler Co. Grants 10 Cents Hour Increase In Pay And 8-Hour Day

The strike precipitated on the Standard Boiler and Plate Iron Company of Ohio, which is building large tanks on the Southern Branch for the Texas Oil Company, was called off yesterday, the company agreeing to accede to the wishes of the men, giving them an eight-hour day instead of nine and 40 and 50 cents per hour instead of 30 and 40 cents, the same pay that the Ritter and Conley Company is paying.

The company claims that the whole affair could have been avoided if the men had gone about the matter in the proper way, by giving the company a reasonable time to hear their proposition and consider it. The company's agents say the men came to the plant yesterday morning and announced to the foreman that they had struck, and refused to return to work until their requests for more pay and shorter hours had been conceded to.

As to alleged discrimination in pay, the foreman states that the 10 cents more on the hour was given the old men who were sent here from New York and who have been with the company for years and are capable of better work by reason of their experience.

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DEDICATE NEW CHURCH AT SOUTH NORFOLK

Norfolk And Portsmouth Ministers Will Assist In Exercises This Afternoon

The beautiful new brick and stone Baptist church of South Norfolk, which has just been completed at a cost of about \$20,000, including its furnishings, will be dedicated this afternoon at 3 o'clock with a special service in which many ministers of Norfolk, Portsmouth and vicinity will participate.

The structure was started last fall with the members taking an active part in contributing their service towards its construction. The church was built under the supervision of Johnson Brothers, and the pastor, Rev. W. M. Black, who was one of the leading factors in working out the plans and aiding his congregation to get a modern church at a nominal cost.

Rev. John Roach Straton, D. D., pastor of the First Baptist church, Norfolk, will be the principal speaker at the exercises.

The building has a capacity of about one thousand and is equipped with Sunday school class rooms, both adjoining the main auditorium and in the basement of the church. The building

is to be heated with hot water. The church has a large basement, a part of which will be used as an assembly hall, dining room and kitchen complete, where church suppers, festivals, etc., will be held in the future.

BUYS PLUMBING BUSINESS

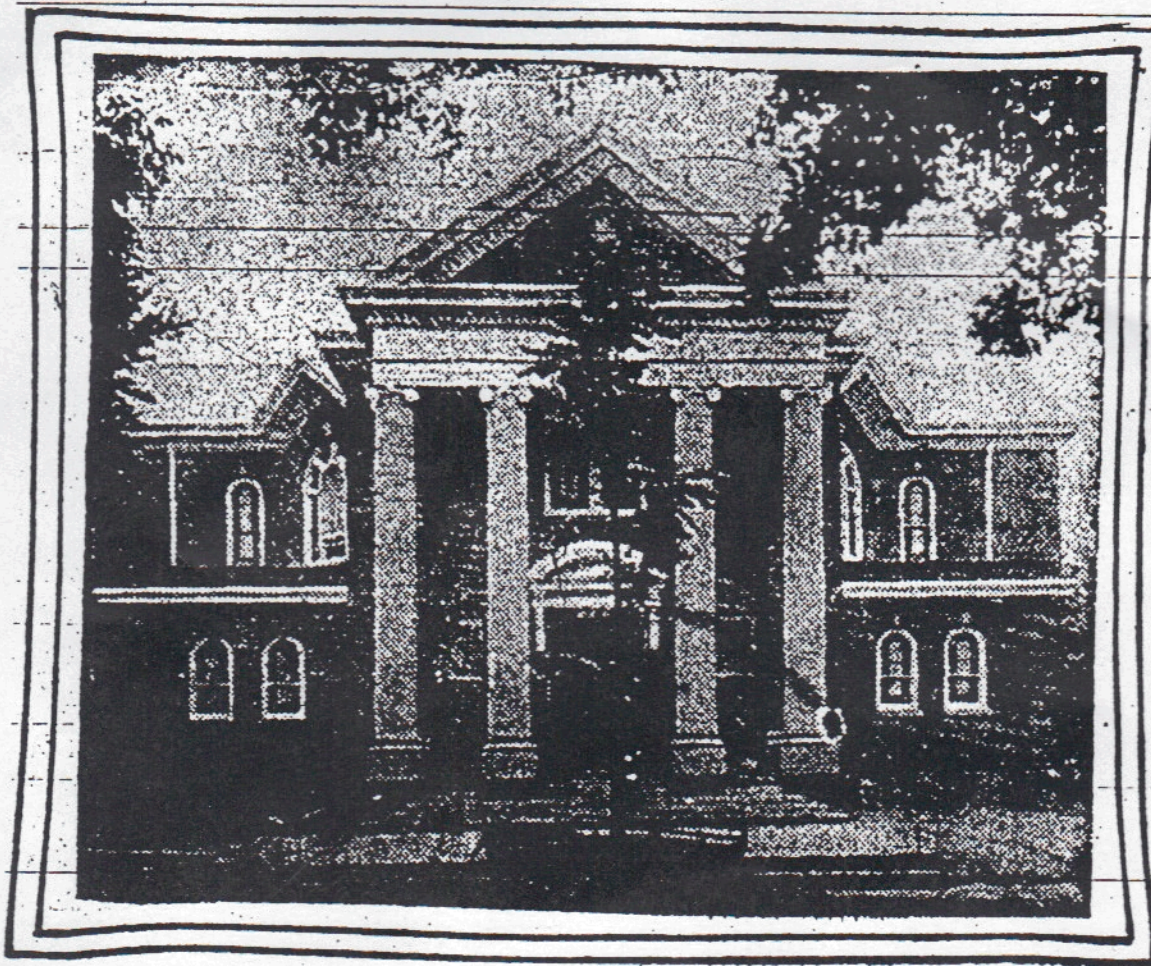

SUBSCRIBE \$11,000 FOR CHURCH BUILDING FUND

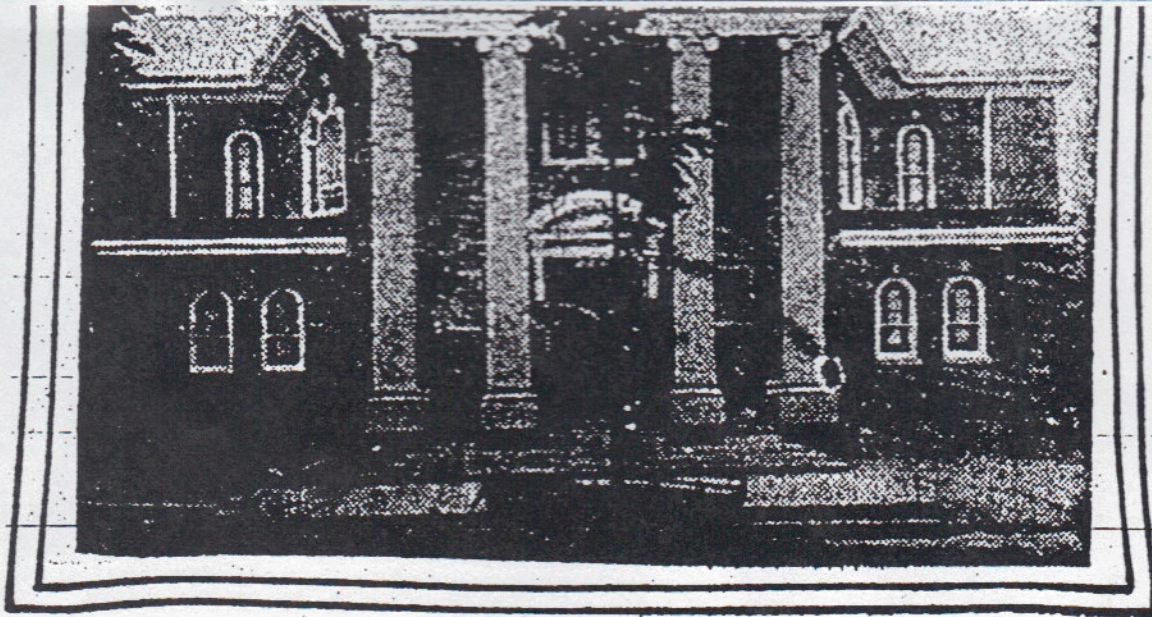
