

# SHARKEY SLATED FOR FEDERAL JOB

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Senator Williams to Urge  
His Appointment As Public  
Money Receiver.

President Wilson could not make a more satisfactory appointment than that of H. Clay Sharkey, veteran legislator, oilmill man and Confederate soldier, to be receiver of public moneys for Mississippi. It is reported here that Senator Williams and other men in the Mississippi delegation in Congress have indorsed him to both the secretary of the interior and President Wilson, and it is expected that his name will be sent to the Senate shortly. He was not an applicant directly, but his name was strongly urged by his friends upon Senator Williams. The position of receiver of public moneys is now held by Thomas V. McAllister, a negro Republican, of Vicksburg.

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
