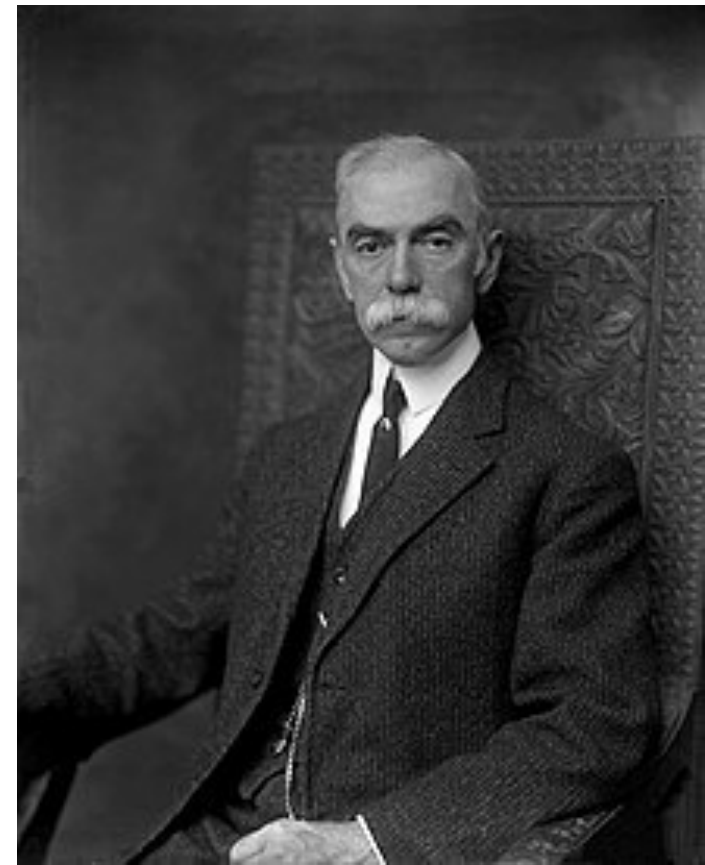
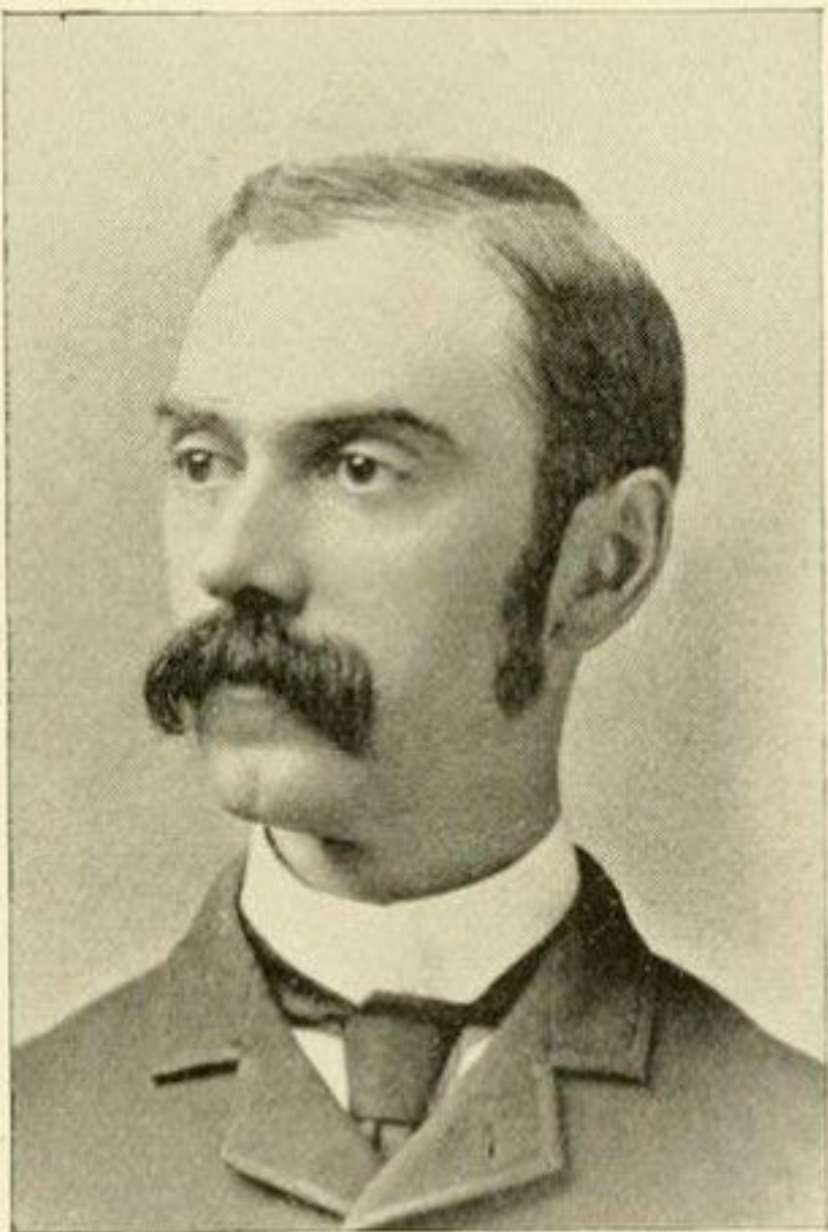




**STAINED GLASS OF ST. MATTHEW, GIVEN

SECRETARY OF THE BAPTIST EDUCATION
BOARD OF VIRGINIA FOR 46 YEARS.**



Like his father and his younger brother William Ellyson, both of whom were Baptist lay leaders, Ellyson was a dedicated Baptist. He served as corresponding secretary of the Virginia Baptist Education Board from 1874 until his death. He won election three times as president of the Baptist General Association of Virginia, in 1890, 1891, and 1892, and once as a vice president of the Southern Baptist Convention, in 1895. Ellyson worked as the business manager of the *Religious Herald* from 1880 until 1888, when he and a partner bought a half-interest in the paper. He subsequently served until January 1893 as secretary and treasurer of the Religious Herald Company, which published the Baptist organ.

J. TAYLOR ELLYSON
CLAIMED BY DEATH
Former Lieutenant Governor
Of Virginia Succumbs To
Heart Trouble

Richmond, Va., March 18.—J. Taylor Ellyson, former lieutenant governor of Virginia, distinguished Confederate veteran and prominent Baptist, died at 10 o'clock this morning at his home here in the 72nd year of his age. Though he had been in failing health for several years, his death was unexpected.

An affection of the heart was assigned as the cause of death. For years Mr. Ellyson was one of the most conspicuous figures in Virginia's political, religious and military life. His funeral will take place here Thursday. Besides his widow, he leaves one daughter, Mrs. Frank T. Crump, and one grandson, James Taylor Ellyson Crump. He also leaves one brother, William Ellyson, and one sister, Miss Bettie Ellyson. Another brother, Theodore Ellyson, died three weeks ago.

The funeral will take place at 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon at the Second Baptist church, and burial will be in Hollywood cemetery. The services will be conducted by Rev. T. Claggett Skinner, D. D., pastor of the church.

James Taylor Ellyson was born in Richmond on May 20, 1847, the son of Henry K. and Elizabeth P. Ellyson. He was a student of Columbia college, Richmond college, and a graduate of the University of Virginia in 1869. The same year he married Lora E. Hotchkiss of Howardsville, Va.

He served in the Confederate States army as a members of the Second company, Richmond howitzers, surrendering with his command at Appomattox, and resumed his college work.

Upon leaving college Mr. Ellyson engaged in commercial business in Richmond. He served as president of the city council, president of the board of public interests, was state senator from 1885 until 1888, which year he was elected mayor of Richmond, and served for three terms. For three terms, ending 1918, he was lieutenant-governor of Virginia, retiring from that office when he became a candidate for governor.

For twenty-five years he was the chairman of the state democratic committee, and many times a delegate to state and national conventions of the party.

He served as president of the Jefferson Davis Monument association,

president of the Richmond Howitzers' association, Confederate Memorial association, and was an active member of R. E. Lee and Pickett-Buchanan camps, United Confederate Veterans, and represented them annually as delegate at general conventions and reunions.

Mr. Ellyson was chairman of the Richmond school board for sixteen years, and a member and president of the Richmond college board of trustees. For forty years he was executive officer of the educational board of the Baptist general association of Virginia, was president of the Virginia State Baptist association, vice-president Southern Baptist convention, and a representative on the state mission board, the orphanage board and educational board; he was president of the Baptist convention of North America. He was governor of the division of history, education and social economy at the Jamestown Ter-Centennial Exposition, 1907. He was a member of the Association for the Preservation of Virginia Antiquities, Confederate Memorial and Literary society. He served as lieutenant-governor continuously from 1906 until 1918.
